Achievement Assemblies




Year 9 Computing students were learning how to decode images with binary numbers, and using the computer to represent all forms of data.

Students used their booklets to plan their work using the numerical representations of Os and 1s instead of decimal digits.

Teaching the last week of any term pose many challenges for schools. Here at Laurel Park, we teach to the top every lesson including the week before Christmas. Our school ethos reflects this and the work seen this week in lessons show the high expectations we have for our classrooms.

In English, year 11s got feedback from their recent assessment and are working exceptionally hard to ensure they do well in their external exams. Students were also seen annotating their anthology with the guidance and support of Ms Mahmud-Smith.

These year 11s demonstrate what great focus and learning look like in the last week of a busy term.









The best evidence indicates that great teaching is the most important lever that schools have to improve pupil outcomes. That is why our teachers in the last week of term have the same level of commitment as they did the first week in September. We support our students and build on previous learning and achievements.

Ms Gray and Ms Barmpanaki above committed to the Laurel Park way of teaching and learning in the last week of term.



Students in RE debated the role of religion in gender equality. There were insightful discussions around how gender equality is seen and taught, and the impact that traditional and religious views have on the issue. Students used their experiential backgrounds to contribute to the lesson; they demonstrated how specifics teachings they are familiar with, have challenged or supported gender equality.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators SAFETY ON SOCIAL MEDI

Currently, children are growing up in an immediate and throwaway culture when it comes to content that's consumed online. So much material is now deliberately created to be shorter in nature – and may often contain hidden elements such as advertising, or extreme political and cultural views. With complex algorithms built to keep people on their phones and engaging with social media content, it's becoming increasingly difficult to reduce time spent on these platforms.

REDUCE DOOMSCROLLING

It's concerningly common for young people to spend hours 'doomscrolling': trawling through social media and aimlessly viewing every post they see, many of which might make them feel sad or anxious. Social media can be useful for keeping in touch with friends and family, as well as staying up to date on current events. However, it's important to use it with a clear purpose, instead of endlessly scrolling through content, which could lead to young people accidentally discovering harmful material.

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TALK ABOUT THE CONTENT

It's important to keep appraised of the kind of content that a young person is being exposed to Discussing what they're watching online can help you understand why they're using social media in the first place. Furthermore, ensure that children are aware of hidden content, such as advertising of a product - and that they know how to spot that the creator is being paid to talk about it.

FIND POSITIVE ASPECTS

Despite all the concerns, there's plenty of wholesome content on social media. It's worth spending time with children to help them find something suitable and enjoyable. Perhaps you'll even discover a joint interest, and you can enjoy the content alongside the child. As part of this, you should also point out why certain things shouldn't be given attention, explaining why it isn't suitable and why it's been created in the first place.

REDUCE SCREENTIME 4

Young people can sometimes be unaware of the exact amount of time they spend looking at social media. Smart phones don't just have the capacity to monitor screentime; they also record how much time is spent on each app. Consider setting targets to reduce this and support children to meet these goals, gradually reducing the amount of time spent on different apps.

FILL THE VOID

Monitoring and reducing screentime can create a lot of free time to fill, and young people can even face withdrawal symptoms when made to step away from their phones. To mitigate this, consider what offline activities you could introduce the child to, and what they would enjoy. This can ensure that young users will permanently cut down on their screentime, rather than temporarily doing so while they know it's being

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REDUCE NOTIFICATIONS

One way in which social media platforms keep people coming back is through notifications. The algorithms behind these apps track people's daily habits, including the times of the day where they're most likely to engage with the platform. This data is then used to deliver

specifically timed notifications to draw them back in. To avoid young users being exposed to this tactic, simply

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Overexposure to social media can distort someone's perception of the real world – from body norms to social conventions. This filtered environment can make it hard for young people to distinguish reality from online content, which is now becoming even more difficult with the rise of AI. To mitigate this concern, take

time to teach young people how to discern truth from fiction, both on and off social media.
